We believe extreme poverty can be ended in our lifetime.

Collectively we will do all we can to move towards the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals by 2015.

In the next four years we will:

Double our efforts in countries facing extreme poverty, allowing 30,000 more children to attend school, and equipping and enabling 500 key local leaders in these countries to develop and implement relevant poverty reduction initiatives.

Double the number of Australians engaged at least weekly in the movement to end extreme poverty from 4000 to 8000.

Double the number of Australians reached annually through our advocacy campaigns from 500,000 to one million, encouraging people to take personal action in the effort to end extreme poverty.

Signed at Admiralty House, Sydney, on Friday the 1st April 2011.

By 2015 Action Plans.

Spark* will enable 500 key local leaders and changemakers to scale up projects already making an impact in countries facing extreme poverty.

The Oaktree Foundation will provide education opportunities for a further 10,000 children in countries facing extreme poverty.

The Global Poverty Project will educate and inspire 160,000 Australians to join the movement to end extreme poverty.

YGAP (Y Generation Against Poverty) will provide education facilities for 10,500 children, improved medical access to 1200 people and homes for 200 orphans in countries facing extreme poverty; and engage 800 volunteers and indirectly engage over 25,000 people through events and social enterprises.

Make Poverty History will educate and inspire 100,000 Australians to take action to end extreme poverty.

V-Gen (Vision Generation) will directly engage with more than 500,000 Australians, encouraging and inspiring them to take action in the effort to end extreme poverty, and mobilise 300,000 hours of volunteers efforts each year.

UN Women Australia will increase the leadership capacity of 10,000 young female leaders in Australia and engage them in the effort to end extreme poverty.

40K Foundation will provide 10,000 children with access to education in India.

YEAH (Youth Empowerment Against HIV/AIDS) will train 100 young Australians to be HIV/AIDS Peer educators, and engage a further 25,000 through events and advocacy campaigns.

[co]design (Community Oriented Design) will design and build community infrastructure for 1000 families in the Asia Pacific.

TEAR (Transformation, Empowerment, Advocacy, Relief) will establish a further 50 advocacy and fundraising hubs across Australia.

Micah Challenge will engage Christians in every electorate in Australia with a particular focus on 25 key electorates.

Kickstart Kids will provide a home for 100 orphans in Kenya.

Engineers Without Borders will engage 4000 volunteers, and a further 6000 engineering students in the effort to end extreme poverty.

IYPF (International Young Professionals Foundation) will indirectly engage 250,000 young professionals internationally and support 20 national and international projects that aim to achieve the MDGs.

Reach Foundation will build awareness of extreme poverty among 65,000 young Australians.
